A Doll's House tells the story of Nora Helmer, a woman who realizes she has lived her whole life as someone else's "doll"—first her father's, then her husband's. She marries young, never experiences independence, and ultimately leaves her marriage to discover who she really is.

My experience stands in sharp contrast. I married at fortyfour, after many years of living independently and building my own life. Unlike Nora, I had the chance to form my identity before marriage. By the time I chose to marry, it was not because society demanded it, but because it was right for me. My decision came from freedom, not expectation.

At the time of the original play, marriage was almost inevitable, and it often defined a woman entirely. That lack of choice for women has played throughout many generations

that followed. My later marriage reflects a different reality: I had the ability to wait, and to enter marriage only when it matched my own desires. In a sense, I began my marriage with the independence Nora leaves hers to find.

In a way, my story reverses Nora's. She left marriage to grow into herself, while I entered marriage already knowing who I was. Both journeys highlight the same truth: every woman deserves the freedom to define herself.

An Interview With Amy Herzog by Joe Dziemianowicz

Tony nominee Amy Herzog flips the script on 'A Doll's House'

The Pulitzer finalist adapted Ibsen's classic for a Jessica Chastain-led Broadway revival. In a rare ruling, she was nominated for Best Play Revival as a writer.

Playwright Amy Herzog's adaptation of Henrik Ibsen's *A Doll's House*, starring Jessica Chastain and directed by Jamie Lloyd, marked her Broadway debut. In a dramatic twist, the show also put her in the running for a Tony Award for Best Play Revival.

That prize typically only goes to producers; a playwright is only eligible for Best Play upon a show's Broadway debut. But since Herzog did more than simply translate Ibsen's work — she adapted it, reworking some of the language with a modern edge — it counts as a new, and therefore newly eligible, piece of writing.

Herzog, whose plays include *Mary Jane*, *Belleville*, and the Pulitzer-nominated *4000 Miles*, marveled at her unique situation. "I didn't understand how unusual and special it was," she said. "But apparently the producing team petitioned ahead of time for me to be named as a nominee."

"I was really honored and surprised," she added. "Being a translator is usually a pretty silent, thankless job, and they've been just so good to me, everyone, including Jamie and Jessica."

Between her Tony nomination – the production's five other nods include Best Actress, Best Director, and Best Featured Actor (Arian Moayed) – and the success of the show at the Hudson Theatre (NYTG's critic gave it a five-star review), Herzog feels heard and seen. She's the one who brought "these words into the present day" while maintaining the time-honored story of 19th-century housewife Nora Helmer (Chastain), who seeks independence from her controlling husband (Moayed).

In advance of the Tony Awards, Herzog talked with New York Theatre Guide about choosing the words and "chasing a holy grail" of capturing Ibsen's original intention while also giving herself leeway to find what felt immediate to her.

What drew you to Ibsen's 1879 play?

It's a great play. It's extraordinary to spend this much time with it. Ibsen has had a really big influence on my work. My play *Belleville* is actually kind of a riff on *A Doll's House*. It felt like a very natural pairing to me.

Ibsen wrote a lot of plays, and some of them are in a much kind of bigger, more civic mode. But this one, even though it has this reputation as this really political play, is rooted in the intimacy between these different characters. And that's what really excited me about returning to it.

Your version runs around 2 hours, compared to a typical 3 hours. Was that intentional?

I was conscious of wanting to lose some time off the original just because we aren't as patient as we used to be. When I sat and looked at the play, there were a lot of redundancies. In a lovely way, that kind of imitates life and the way people repeat themselves. But I just don't think it registers the same way to contemporary audiences.

Your script hews close to the original translation in some places and leaps to 2023 in others – like when Torvald calls Nora a "stupid bitch."

That was a really difficult decision. In the original he says something like "You miserable, wretched -" and cuts himself off. "Stupid bitch" is not a [far] cry from things that men call women these days. It just felt like we should just give the audience the experience of the real nastiness.

A Doll's House traces the awakening of Nora Helmer from her previously unexamined life of domestic, wifely comfort. Having been ruled her whole life by either her father or her husband Torvald, Nora finally comes to question the foundation of everything she has believed in once her marriage is put to the test.

Having borrowed money from a man of ill-repute named Krogstad by forging her father's signature, she was able to pay for a trip to Italy to save her sick husband's life (he was unaware of the loan, believing that the money came from Nora's father.) Since then, she has had to contrive ways to pay back her loan, growing particularly concerned with money and the ways of a complex world.

What is A Doll's House about?

A Doll's House is set in 19th-century Norway and follows Nora Helmer, the wife of a bank manager and mother of three children. Her life seems perfect, but there's trouble hiding behind the facade. For one, she is keeping a financial secret from her husband that threatens to ruin their marriage and her standing if it gets out. For another, she realizes she's not truly happy in her marriage and wants to forge her own independent life. The play explores the themes of gender roles, marriage, and the struggle for freedom in a restrictive society.

Where did the revival of *A Doll's House* play?

A Doll's House played at the Hudson Theatre, located at 141 W 44th St. between Sixth and Seventh Avenues. It is both Broadway's oldest and newest theatre: The building first opened in 1903, but it only reopened in 2017 as a Broadway theatre after being shut down and fully renovated.

When did A Doll's House premiere?

A Doll's House was written by Henrik Ibsen in 1879, and it premiered in Denmark in December of that year. The show did not premiere on Broadway, however, until 10 years later, in December of 1889. The show has since had countless productions all over the world. Here is a short history of A Doll's House's early development and key milestones in the years since.

- 1879: Ibsen wrote and premiered *A Doll's House*. The premiere run sold out and received critical acclaim. There was also plenty of backlash about Ibsen's questioning of standard gender roles and the ideal of marriage and motherhood.
- 1880: Ibsen had to rewrite his play with a less controversial ending in order to get it produced in Germany. Multiple subsequent productions would also only produce the show with the alternate ending, but it is rarely used today.
- 1889: A Doll's House premieres on Broadway, starring

Beatrice Cameron as Nora.

- 2006: This year is the 100th anniversary of Ibsen's death. *A Doll's House* was the most frequently performed play in the world that year.
- 2023: *A Doll's House* has its latest Broadway revival, starring Jessica Chastain.

Who wrote A Doll's House?

A Doll's House is by Henrik Ibsen, a Norwegian playwright and poet who is widely considered one of the fathers of modern theatre. A Doll's House is arguably his best-known play, but his other famous works include Hedda Gabler, Ghosts, An Enemy of the People, and The Wild Duck. Ibsen is the most frequently performed playwright in the world after Shakespeare.

For the 2023 revival of *A Doll's House*, Amy Herzog has adapted lbsen's script. Herzog is a Pulitzer Prize finalist for her play *4000 Miles*, and her other plays include *Belleville*, *The Great God Pan*, and *After the Revolution*.

A Doll's House features the Helmers along with some of their close friends and acquaintances. Every character knows things others don't, and tensions rise as their various secrets get revealed. Here are the main characters in A Doll's House.

- Nora Helmer: The main character of the play, a wife and mother who is struggling to break out of the housewife mold and find her own identity. Jessica Chastain plays her in the 2023 revival.
- Torvald Helmer: Nora's husband and a bank manager. He claims to love her deeply, but he often tries to exhibit control over her.
- Dr. Rank: A close friend of the Helmers who has a fatal illness. He is secretly in love with Nora.
- Kristine Linde: Nora's old friend who has recently been widowed.
- Krogstad: An employee of Torvald's bank. He previously lived a scoundrel's life and has since turned it around, but he blackmails Nora out of desperation when he loses his job.

- 1975 Broadway revival: Liv Ullmann earned Tony and Drama Desk Award nominations for her performance as Nora Helmer.
- 1997 Broadway revival: This production won all four Tony Awards it was nominated for: Best Revival of a Play, Best Direction Of A Play (for Anthony Page), Best Actress In A Play (for Janet McTeer as Nora), and Best Featured Actor In A Play (for Owen Teale as Torvald). It also won the Drama Desk Award for Outstanding Revival Of A Play. McTeer won the Drama Desk for Outstanding Actress In A Play and was a Theatre World Award recipient.

Major productions of A Doll's House

In the nearly 150 years since *A Doll's House* premiered, the show has received countless productions across the globe. Here is a selection of notable performances of this renowned play.

- 1879 Denmark premiere: The original production of *A Doll's House* premiered in Copenhagen. Betty Hennings originated the role.
- 1880 German premiere: A production in Flensburg was the first to feature an alternate ending, as the lead actress did not want to portray Nora leaving her children. Though he did not want to rewrite the play, lbsen did it anyway to avoid having another playwright do it for him.
- 1884 London premiere: A Doll's House premiered in London under the title Breaking a Butterfly. Henry Arthur Jones and Henry Herman adapted Ibsen's script to make it more of a traditional morality play.
- 1889 Broadway premiere: Beatrice Coleman originated the role of Nora on Broadway at the Palmer's Theatre. Previously, *A Doll's House*'s American premiere took place in Louisville, Kentucky in 1883.

- 1997 Broadway revival: Janet McTeer starred in the show's most recent Broadway revival. It won all four Tony Awards it was nominated for, including Best Revival of a Play.
- 2023 Broadway revival: Jessica Chastain led the current Broadway revival of *A Doll's House*. The show was initially planned to go up in London and mark her West End debut. Instead, she returned to Broadway for the first time in 10 years.

Celebrities who've performed in A Doll's House

Such a storied play is bound to attract many celebrated actors, and it has. Lots of celebrities have taken on the iconic roles of Nora, Torvald, and more. Discover the celebrities who have starred in *A Doll's House* and which productions they led.

- Jessica Chastain: Chastain is known for her performances in films such as *The Help, Zero Dark Thirty, Interstellar*, and *Molly's Game*. She won an Oscar in 2022 for The *Eyes of Tammy Faye*. A *Doll's House* marks her second Broadway outing after 2012's *The Heiress*. Learn more about Chastain's past theatre credits.
- Beatrice Cameron: Cameron originated the role of Nora on Broadway in 1889. She performed in six Broadway plays in 10 years, from 1887-97, before retiring from acting in 1898.
- Liv Ullmann: Ullman is often regarded as one of the greatest European actresses of all time. She received a Tony Award nomination for her portrayal of Nora in the 1975 A Doll's House Broadway revival.
- Jane Fonda and David Warner: Oscar winner Fonda and Emmy winner Warner played the Helmer spouses in a Doll's House movie in 1973. It was one of two film adaptations of the play released that year.
- Claire Bloom and Anthony Hopkins: Golden Age Hollywood actress Bloom and Academy Award winner Hopkins played Nora and Torvald, respectively, in the other 1973 film adaptation of *A Doll's House*.
- Julie Harris and Christopher Plummer: This famous pair played the Helmer spouses in a 1959 TV movie of A Doll's House.
- Janet McTeer: McTeer won a Tony Award for her performance as Nora in the 1997 A Doll's House Broadway revival.
- Gillian Anderson: Emmy Award winner Anderson starred as Nora in a 2009 London production of *A Doll's House*, newly translated by Zinnie Harris.
- George Bernard Shaw: At the end of the 19th century, the renowned playwright played Krogstad in a private *A Doll's House* production in London.



- Jan Maxwell: Five-time Tony nominee Jan Maxwell played Kristine Linde in the Tony-winning 1997 Broadway revival.
- Judith Light: Before Light became a multi-awardwinning stage and screen actress, Light made her Broadway debut as Helene, the Helmers' maid, in 1975.
- Laurie Metcalf: Laurie Metcalf never starred in a major production of A Doll's House, but she starred in Lucas Hnath's sequel play A Doll's House, Part 2, which sees Nora return to the Helmers 15 years after leaving. Metcalf won her first Tony Award for her performance as Nora.

Onscreen adaptations of A Doll's House

A Doll's House hasn't received quite as many film adaptations as stage productions, but there's still a great many movie versions. Here are some of the major film adaptations.

- 1959: Julie Harris and Christopher Plummer starred in a TV film adaptation. The movie was actually a live performance of the play that was filmed and broadcast.
- 1973: A Doll's House was adapted twice for film in 1973. One film starred Claire Bloom and Anthony Hopkins; the other, Jane Fonda and David Warner. The Fonda adaptation is particularly notable for its casting of Fonda, a feminist who was actively speaking out for women's rights at the time.

• 2012: Nora, a short film released by London's Young Vic theatre, imagined Nora as a modern-day woman. Hattie Morahan played the title character.

Fun facts about A Doll's House

- A Doll's House is sometimes translated to English as A Doll House because "dollhouse" is a common English word. Some scholars argue, though, that the different translation slightly changes the title's meaning.
- A Doll's House has gotten multiple sequels. Betty Comden, Adolph Green, and Larry Grossman wrote a musical sequel called A Doll's Life, and Lucas Hnath wrote a play called A Doll's House, Part 2. Both imagine what Nora did after leaving her family.
- A Doll's House has been translated into more than 50 languages.
- The characters of Nora and Torvald are loosely based on Ibsen's friend and her husband, Laura and Victor Kieler.
- Ibsen is quoted as saying that A Doll's House is a "modern tragedy" of how women could not be [themselves] in society, "with laws made by men and with prosecutors and judges who assess feminine conduct from a masculine standpoint!"

Paul and Corie are newlyweds in every sense of the word. He's a straight-as-an-arrow lawyer and she's a free spirit always looking for the latest kick. Their new apartment is her most recent find – too expensive with bad plumbing and in need of a paint job. After a quick honeymoon, they get a surprise visit from Corie's loopy mother and decide to play matchmaker with their neighbor-in-the-attic, Velasco, at a dinner where everything that can go wrong does.
